Glendo School Four Day Schedule by Jane Bekelja **Bound?**

On Monday, April 15 at the Platte County School District Board Meeting, the topic of Glendo Schools having a four-day schedule came up. After some discussion, the board passed the schedule unanimously. The Wyoming State Board of Education has to agree on the change. Glendo Schools held two required meetings to hear public comments about moving to a fourday schedule. Tom Waring, the new principal of Glendo Schools, led the meeting. "I was asked to look into this by some parents and teachers."

The State of Wvoming requires students in Kindergarten to Sixth grade to have 900 teacher contact hours. Middle school/Junior High the required teacher contact hours with students is 950. To make the schedule they go off the highest grade in the school and the hours the students

need to meet. The current proposed schedule is being sent to the Wyoming State Board of Education and has students receiving 965.25 teacher contact hours.

During the public meetings, there were comments for and against the four-day schedule. From the parents who work on Fridays, they were unsure where their children would go. Glendo doesn't have a daycare in town or any enrichment programs for kids to participate in. Those for the four-day schedule thought it would be easier for them when they were gone due to other commitments.

The alternate schedule has to be reapplied for every year. If the four-day schedule doesn't work then Glendo Schools can change back to a five-day schedule. The Wyoming State Board of Education will make the final decision.


seventh at state in judging overall for middle school.

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Town Council Q & A

Kelly Jones and Andrew Ebel attended the two town council candidates participating in a Q&A on Wednesday, April 24. Questions were asked by various town and surrounding area citizens. Here are some of the questions and answers from the Q&A.

Q: What do you propose to do to help heal the rifts in this town?

Kelly Jones: "I think making sure that we are building on the growth, building on the strength, shutting down any rumors, having an open and transparent government having an open and transparent forum, but also promoting respect in those forums is important. So I think that obviously, just making sure it starts from the top is probably what we need to be doing to start to slow the discourse."

Andrew Ebel: "I think the first part of that is that the governing body really needs to be open and honest, in everything. I think that is a good start. The other thing that I think is really important is that as far as the treatment from the governing body, everyone needs to be treated exactly the same. People need to know what's going on. People need to know the truth instead of hearsay, let's get the truth out. Let's let people talk. Let's get everybody to work together as much as possible."

Q: A concern about the lack of public comment was brought up.

Kelly Jones: "We are still having conversations on the current council about how we can reintroduce some type of public forum. But as always, I would just like to remind you that our doors are open. Or if you have our contact information to call and ask questions. We're not ever saying that you can't ever talk to us or you can't ever let your issues be known. We just ask it to be done in a more respectful and organized manner. Because this is a business meeting."

Andrew Ebel: "I think we should have public comments and the very minimum, people should be able to ask questions, especially when somebody talks about something that's going to be new, people are sitting there listening, and questions are gonna pop into their head, they can't be put on the agenda if they don't know what the information is going to be. So at the very least, I think we should have questions."

Q: The council can run community workshops to get the opinions of the community. Where do you stand on having workshops so we can get more community involvement and more communication out there?

Kelly Jones: "I think that anything that affects the entire town, we need to have feedback."

Andrew Ebel: "I think anything like that would be great. It would be great to have a workshop, anything like that, especially if it's more involved, where people would be able to have more interaction and get more information."

Q: What are your greatest strengths?

Kelly Jones: "I would say my work ethic. I am a self-described workaholic... I think that my ability to have discussions while keeping an open mind is a great strength... My background in journalism, I think will help because I'll be able to research grants and try to expand the communications, as we've talked about. But most of all, I just think that my greatest strength is the love I have for this town and for this community. I want to do everything in my power to see it succeed. And I'm hoping that when I'm sitting up there every month that I'm doing that right now. And as an elected person, I have more involvement with the daily operations.

Andrew Ebel: "I would like to say that work ethic and openness, and honestly, along with, I really like to understand how things work, and how they can improve. And follow the letter of the law and make sure that everyone's treated equal. I think that's where I come from for everything."


Both candidates expressed willingness to conduct research and to attend any training that is needed. They would like to see Glendo grow. Ebel would like to see more families. Jones would like to include more of the greater community. Both would like to know more about the fire department and are willing to attend their meetings. They would like to learn more about the dealings with the hotel. The night's session ended with a hypothetical question.

Q: If you were working on the budget for the town, and there was a need to make repairs to both the water and the sewer, which there is and there happens to be enough money to fix one or the other. Which one would you fix, water or sewer? Which one would you vote for?

Kelly Jones: "I would have to look at the data... Well, it's hard. I mean, you can't have a sewer without water. But our sewer system needs fix it our sewer system needs to be addressed very badly. I guess that's another weakness for me because I rely on facts and data more than I do on hypotheticals. I guess I would have to say right now I'd have to look at the more immediate need. And I think that our sewer system needs to be looked at most immediately. But again, I'd have to look at the data."

Andrew Ebel: "I would have to go with water first. We can't live without water.



1st Meeting For Steering Committee

The steering committee for Keep Glendo Great met for the first time on April 15 in the Town Hall. Greg Burke led the meeting and gave all in-attendance information about what is needed for a 501c.3. The group elected Greg Burke as Chairperson, Ashlie Gray as Secretary, and Larry Collins as Treasurer. The next meeting will be on Monday, May 20 at 7:00 in the Town Hall. Anyone who would like to participate is welcome to join. Below are the duties of the steering committee.

Duties of Steering Committee by Greg Burke

- 1. Setup everything needed to become a 501c3 non-profit organization to assist in non-governmental fund raising for various committees as needed with donations and grants.
- 2. Represent the greater Glendo area in achieving master plan goals.
- 3. Determine a chairperson from the volunteers willing to serve and rotate duties as the group deems most beneficial to the entire committee.
- 4. Shepherd the ongoing activities of other committees formed to support the Town of Glendo Master Plan, in particular Tourism and Events, Communication, Support of Town Businesses, and Beautification. The Town of Glendo government is responsible for infrastructure needs (water, sewage, roads, and similar) as well as communication infrastructure involving internet and cell phone service. The town will also be involved in the Beautification committee as it applies to Town property and town ordinances.
- 5. Meet as a group on some regular basis (bi-monthly or quarterly) to assess ongoing progress towards meeting the town master plan goals.
- 6. Review the master plan goals annually and adjust as needed.
- 7. Bring in ex-officio members as needed for advice and consent on various projects (This could include the Town of Glendo, Platte County, State of WY, and Glendo State Park to name a few).

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Town Council Brief by Jane Bekelja

The town council held their monthly meeting on April 10, 2024.

Two ordinances were introduced. Ordinance 270 deals with the optional one percent sales tax. It passed on its first reading. The second ordinance 271 deals with cemetery fees. The changes are as follows: \$300/Cremation burial during business hours. \$600/Full Burial during business hours, \$600/Cremation burial during non-business hours, and \$800/ Full Burial during non-business hours. This ordinance passed on the first reading with the note that it could change at further readings.

Lori Milnes from the Wyoming Child and Family Development Services came to talk to the council about services being provided for children in our town. The town council agreed to continue a \$200 doand around Glendo.

Andrew Ebel Had some questions about the meeting minutes. In the Glendo Municipal Code it states the town of Glendo should have their meeting minutes posted 48 hours



after the meeting. "According to the Wyoming Open Meeting Law, meeting minutes have to be published within 12 days." Mayor Juschka responded, "Right." Ebel continued, "Does that mean we publish them in 12 days? We do that?" The mayor replied, "Yeah. Not Always." There has been some

confusion in the office, Tristany and Heather thought that the meeting minutes needed to be approved before being posted. Tristany will now get the meeting minutes posted within 48 hours per Glendo Code.

Fire Chief David Noyce asked the Town

Council to let the fire department regain control over their account. Lawver. Eric Jones said that he thought it was under the guidance of the audit that the town had control. Jones

continues to say that he would look into it.

A *Visionary* representative came to continue the conversation about entering a franchise agreement with them. Visionary would like to put fiber-optic in and around Glendo. After some discussion, the council passed the first reading

of Ordinance 272: Visionary Franchise Agreement.

The town council is working on a Water Protection Plan. The construction on Warren will be starting at the beginning of May. The town council is concerned about some vehicles on the street. Letters will go out in water bills to notify owners of the upcoming construction and the need to move vehicles. Kelly Jones would like to continue the discussion of updating employee manu-

There was still **no public** comment option at the April town council meeting. If there are questions the deadline for getting on the May Agenda is Monday, May 6.

Glendo Volunteer Fire & Ambulance Service is committed to engaging our community, whether our station doors are open or not. Always remember, if you have an emergency or need assistance for whatever reason, to call 911, not personal cell phones so that all calls can be paged out and logged for State purposes. We depend on both Fire and EMS to help on all calls.

Call for Service: Fire & EMS work as a team; we usually respond to one another's calls. From March 15th to April 15th, 2024, we had nine calls for service. Six of those calls were medical in nature, two were grass fires, and 1 was a vehicle crash on the highway. Additionally, our firefighters remained on standby to assist with fire incidents across the county.

Training: Fire & EMS have different roles and responsibilities on calls, so we each usually have independent trainings to help with our development in our separate trades, and often come together to enhance teamwork. In April, our Fire & EMS teams as well as the EMR students engaged in collaborative training exercises. We focused on extrication techniques to safely rescue individuals trapped in vehicles, ensuring effective patient care throughout the entire process.

Donations: We are immensely grateful for the ongoing support of our community through generous donations. Each dollar continues to allow us to purchase things like supplies and equipment to be able to keep providing to our community. A special thanks to Anglers Bar for their contribution from a recent cribbage tournament.

Upcoming Community Events: Looking ahead, we're excited to participate in upcoming community events, such as Marge Cares on April 27th and Key Bar Ranch's 1st Annual Pasture Golf Tournament on June 22nd. 




