Kelly Jones

Why do you want to run for town council?

I have wanted to become more involved in Glendo since I became a permanent resident several years ago. When I was asked to consider filling the vacated seat, I thought it would be a good opportunity to "see how the sausage is made," as they say. It also gave me an opportunity to see if I felt it was the right fit and I, the person for the position. I believe I am. I hope I live up to the expectations of the citizens of Glendo proper and also the surrounding community.

How long have you been in Glendo? What brought you here?

I first stumbled upon this little community in 2014 when my husband and I were working in Douglas. We lived at Glendo Lakeside RV Park for four years, where I also worked in the store and bar. 
On the issue of transparency, where do you stand on ensuring all public business is conducted openly and in a manner that encourages public attendance?

I moved to Glendo in 2010 to work on a building for a new business. I fell in love with the town and decided to become a permanent resident.


What do you love about Glendo?

"New life starts in the dark. Whether it is a seed in the ground, a baby in the womb, or Jesus in the tomb, it starts in the dark."

Reflecting on Holy Week, my mind goes to the darkness of events. The Last Supper, the prayer said in the garden, and the betrayal of Judas all occur under the cover of darkness. Moving between and standing before Caiaphas and Pilate also take place in the dark. Then on Friday, as Jesus dies on the cross, darkness shrouds the world. And finally, there is the absolute darkness of the tomb in which the body is placed. This is where new life begins. This is where resurrection starts.

Jesus then begins his journey through death once and for all to a new and radical kind of life, a resurrected life. God did not merely resuscitate the body of the Son of Man. This gracious God of Love raised him to new life as the Christ, the Light of the world.

Resurrection teaches us by

the process of dying and rising how God transforms who we are. In this life we will all encounter what we may call smaller deaths. Duties of Steering Committee by Greg Burke

1. Setup everything needed to become a 501c3 non-profit organization to assist in non-governmental fund raising for various committees as needed with donations and grants.

2. Represent the greater Glendo area in achieving master plan goals.

3. Determine a chairperson from the volunteers willing to serve and rotate duties as the group deems most beneficial to the entire committee.


4. Shepherd the ongoing activities of other committees formed to support the Town of Glendo Master Plan, in particular Tourism and Events, Communication, Support of Town Businesses, and Beautification. The Town of Glendo government is responsible for infrastructure needs (water, sewage, roads, and similar) as well as communication infrastructure involving internet and cell phone service. The town will also be involved in the Beautification committee as it applies to Town property and town ordinances.

5. Meet as a group on some regular basis (bi-monthly or quarterly) to assess ongoing progress towards meeting the town master plan goals.

6. Review the master plan goals annually and adjust as needed.

7. Bring in ex-officio members as needed for advice and consent on various projects (This could include the Town of Glendo, Platte County, State of WY, and Glendo State Park to name a few).

Town Council Brief by Jane Bekelja

The town council held their monthly meeting on March 13, 2024.

Heather Schoening reported that they were able to get the security cameras for the town hall and the shop ordered. They will be installed this month. She talked about who would be able to access the security camera video, Heather suggested for Eric, Tristany and the Mayor to be the only ones. She is still working on getting the game cameras. When Heather met with the engineers for the Warren project she had asked how much it would cost to pave the road after the construction. The company will get her an amount. The town is close to collecting the amount needed for the community center. She would like to get a larger dumpster so they can start cleaning out the building, "I personally think that we need to have a couple of council members and maybe some public input and do a walk through and get some ideas of what they want or what we can afford to put together a design build." If there are salvageable items the town may put them up for sale and the town would take bids on the items.

Dan Dugdale reported that the Downey well is still down but all of the parts are in and will be fixed in the next week. The water main project on Warren that WyoDak is doing will be starting soon. "We need to get a letter out to all residents on that line. We will have small interruptions." Master Plan Grant in a few weeks we will get our GIS mapping system, staff and council will get training on it. He did mention that they were interviewing for an assistant maintenance man and that they had six applicants.

Kelly Jones reported that since they will be having new security cameras installed in town hall she would like to continue the conversation on updating the employee manuals and acknowledgements for the technology.

Genelle Thompson Petsch reported that the new sign is up at the park. The park



bench did get ordered and is put together. The bench will be placed at the Veteran's Memorial after they pour a cement slab. "We thought it'd be better if there were some cement pads up there." The gazebo is coming along; they are just waiting for a warm day to paint. "Thanks to Pam and Dave and Tom and Robin for putting that together." Petsch would like to update the cemetery prices for plots and she would like to know the process of doing that. Eric Jones asked, "The current plot is \$125." Petsch replied, "And that includes perpetual care." Eric Jones: "Now you think we should go to a plot at \$150 plus a perpetual care fee?" Petsch agreed with the statement.

Bob Bud talked to the council about how the budget department now has a grant office. He explained that the grant office will be helping small towns around Wyoming with the grant process to get their infrastructure up to date.

When the state gets ready to run the program they will need pilot communities. "I believe that Glendo is ready. I believe that Glendo should be one of those communities. But the part of this that is not done is for the town to have a strategic plan." In order for Glendo to take advantage of this opportunity the Town Council and the Mayor need to have a strategic plan put into place.


307 Disposal came to talk about trash disposal for the Town of 307 Glendo. offers a 96 gallon option and an option where cus-

tomers can lock their dumpsters. Council seemed to be interested in looking at different proposals from them.

There were some concerns with the 96 gallon option a couple being the wind blowing them around and customers not being able to get their garbage can out for pick up.

"307 hauls their trash to Casper. I don't believe that they have a long term contract with Casper, that's my concern. If Casper would change their mind, where are they going to have to go with their trash and what would they have to charge then?" said Mayor Juschka later in an interview. "Torrington Disposal System (TDS) has their own landfill and bailing station."

TDS will be giving Glendo a new contract soon. So then the council will compare the two offers. "I believe in the presentation 307 Disposal gave us the other night, it's going to be a little bit of a higher bill then what TDS is. We have to look at that



for our people, our users."

When asked if they will open it up for public coment, the Mayor said, "Possibly. The service covers the whole town. The town pretty much has to make the decsision on it." The Mayor is unclear how it would work if they offered both survices in town.

Visionary: A representitive from Visionary, a fiber optic internet service, spoke with the town council about entering a franchise agreement with them. They would like to bring their fiber optic internet service to Glendo and the surrounding communities. A benefit of fiber is it's the most upgradable internet on the horizon.

If a franchise agreement is signed then Visionary would start laying their fiber optic line in June. In a later interview, Mayor Juschka explained, "A franchise agreement just means that we are allowing them to lay their lines." They would be putting them mostly in the allies, Mayor Juschka believed. It's not just in town that Visionary will be laying fiber, "They are going clear out to the cabin area and around the marina. It's really going to open it up in that area." Mayor Juschka said, "Hopefully it will set up some competition and one of them will lower their prices. And that is one reason why they are coming in here." A representative from Visionary will be at the April 10 Town Council meeting to answer any auestions.

There was still no public comment option at the March town council meeting. If there are questions the deadline for getting on the April Agenda is **Monday, April 8 at 6:00pm.**


