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Glendo Track Sees Improvements by Jane Bekelja

The Glendo Middle School track team saw huge improvements all around this year. With only one athlete having experience it was a great opportunity for all.

Grady Erb placed in every track meet he competed in this year, his record for the long jump was 16'5".

Carlee Hill started the year throwing 20' in shot-put and ended throwing 22'3". Throwing discus Hill was able to improve seven feet! In shot-put, Tra Bauder ended the year throwing 22'10" and Clay Daly threw 20'. In discus Daly threw 58'7" and Bauder threw 54'.

In the long jump Wade Erb showed a huge

improvement with a jump of 12'3". Braily Goode's best long jump was 11'1". Goode also ran hurdles and showed a two-second improvement.

Eleanor Ebel, the youngest of the bunch, improved her 200-yard race by three seconds in one meet. "Eleanor is eleven years old and competing against 13-year-olds!" Explained Coach Eller.

The team looks forward to next year with some teammates looking to try new events. "Praise them all. They all did great! They are a great bunch to work with," exclaimed Coach Eller.

Glendo Volunteer Fire & Ambulance Service is committed to engaging our community, whether our station doors are open or not. Call for Service: Fire & EMS work as a team; we usually respond to one another's calls. From April 15th to May 15th, 2024, we had five calls for service. Four of those calls were medical in nature and 1 was a vehicle crash on the highway. Additionally, our firefighters remained on standby to assist with fire incidents across the county.

Training: Fire & EMS have different roles and responsibilities on calls, so we each usually have independent trainings to help with our development in our separate trades, and often come together to enhance teamwork. In May, our Fire department held a ropes rescue training at Glendo State Parks with EMS, Fire, and State Parks invited. Chief Noyce also hosted an Initial Red Card Training in preparation to the anticipated Wildland Fire Season. For EMS, the local 1.5-month EMR course was completed which had 15 students, 8 of which will be new Volunteer EMR's for our local service! EMS also had the opportunity to meet with the State EMS Office to learn more about the changes that will be coming for the different license levels.

Donations: We are immensely grateful for the ongoing support of our community through generous donations. Each dollar continues to allow us to purchase things like supplies and equipment to be able to keep providing to our community. A special thanks to Kent and Pam Allen for their generous donation to EMS.

Town Council Brief

On Wednesday, May 8 Glendo Town Council held their monthly meeting.

An update was given on why last month's treasurer's report had a negative balance in the dumping and hauling account, Tristany Hoffman said, "I've been taking TDS out of dumping and hauling but previously I guess we've been taking it out of the sewer (account). We didn't set enough aside in the dumping and hauling (account) budget-wise." After a few more questions the treasurer's report was passed.

There were four ordinances on the agenda, the council opened the floor for questions specific to the ordinances being read.

Ordinance #270: 1 cent sales tax passed unanimously on its third reading without any questions from the public.

Council member, Genelle Petsch discussed **Ordinance #271: Cemetery Fees** specifically not having the smaller fee for an infant to three-year-old burial. Even though an out-lying source recommends keeping the smaller charge, Petsch said, "I think still our equipment is out there, people are out there, it's probably the same amount of time." Other council members agreed with Petsch. Other changes are as follows: \$200 for a single plot, a one-time perpetual care fee for \$200, opening and closing full burial is \$600, opening and closing for cremation is \$300, disinterment during working hours is \$600, and disinterment during non-business hours is \$800. These rates will increase by 5% each year, effective July 1 of the fiscal year. The increase shall not begin until July 1, 2025. Any equipment rented will be paid at the cost of rental plus 10%. One question was asked on why they picked July 1, 2025. "We're just passing it now. And we'll pass it in June on a final reading then on July 1 it would go up 5%. And that did not seem equitable. So, that's how July 1, 2025, began," replied lawyer, Eric Jones. The 2nd reading passed unanimously. Note: This ordinance was passed in a special meeting on Wednesday, May 22.

The Visionary Broadband Franchise, Ordinance #272 had its third and final reading. There were questions about getting Visionary out in the Quilson Subdivision. Brian Worthen from Visionary Broadband said that after looking at Quilson and the Business Park he would like to put some fiber-optic over there but it wouldn't be until phase two of the project. When asked how deep Visionary was to dig, the response was only 24 to 36 inches. When a con-

cern about digging up unknown lines was mentioned, Worthen replied, "We've run into this before in small towns, we do our best. And the goal will be to have as little impact as possible." Visionary will provide maps of where they put their lines for the town records. The ordinance passed unanimously.

Ordinance #267: Vendor's Permit is being revised and will be known as Ordinance #273. Council member Heather Schonging said that community members have been discussing a farmers market and the current fees make this unfeasible. An idea of seasonal permits was made. Additionally, the old ordinance states that vendors are not allowed on town property. A suggested edit of vendors will be allowed on town property with an application and approval from the town council was made. Dan Dugdale said, "We do a first reading tonight and pass it. Let everybody know we're talking about vendor permits whenever we have this next meeting we'll open it up to talk about vendor ideas and see if we get to make changes and address the Farmers Market concerns." Ordinance #273 passed on its first reading unanimously.

Town Council approved \$22,000 to buy a 2018 f150 Crew Cab truck as the second maintenance truck for the town. They also approved the Game and Fish lease agreement with the conversation that when construction of the community center starts they will relocate to another part of the parking lot. A community member asked council members what they looked over when they approved the treasurer's report, revenue report, and claims for consideration. Malcolm Ervin reported on the town council elections that his office helped with. The town council approved the canvassing board members that Ms. Hoffman had recommended.

A Poppy Day Proclamation of 2024 was made by Mayor Susan Juschka declaring Friday, May 24, as National Poppy Day she asks, "...that all citizens pay tribute to those who have made the ultimate sacrifice in the name of freedom by wearing the Memorial Poppy on this day."

Heather Schonging asked about the burn pile hours and if the town was still charging for out-of-towners and commercial use. The burn pile hours are Wednesdays from 12:00 to 2:00 and the 1st and 3rd Saturdays from 10:00 to 12:00. She also wanted to make sure that Steve was putting aside any antique or nostalgic items found while cleaning out the soon-to-be com-

munity center. They can use the items for decoration when the center is complete.

Dan Dugdale mentioned that the meters will be read this month. He said that they need to work on getting the sewer lines flushed. The AVI master plan hinted that Glendo will be headed into Stage 3 of the plan, which is the construction phase. "Their first recommendation for us is that the well house and all the above ground be redone and the separation of chlorine at both of our facilities." There will be a time set for the public to come and hear all the information on the project and to ask questions. A question was asked if the chlorine was injected continuously or once a month, and Dugdale replied, "Continual injection." The waterline on Warren is currently being replaced they have been having some issues with this. "There'll be another one I'm sure, it's just an old system. Lines aren't even where they're supposed to be. They hit one that's not supposed to be there, that was the problem." Dugdale said.

Kelly Jones asked Eric Jones if they had any more information about having the fire department accounts under the town instead of the fire department having it independently. Eric Jones is trying to get answers from the Department of Audit. Council member Jones also thanked Dan, Steve, and the town clerks for their transparency on the water issue. She also reminded all to view the Facebook page.

Genelle Petsch discussed the dead trees in the park and the location of the cement pad for the benches with Head of Maintenance, Steve Eller. She thanked everyone for coming to Marge Cares, "If any of you know of anybody that needs help, please send them my way and we will get checks sent out to them."

Discussion of the Wilson/Collins property variance started with Petsch reading a portion of the variance, "Seasonal recreation vehicle rentals shall be a minimum of 90 days and a maximum of 210 days." There is thinking that some of the RVs have been there longer than 210 days. The variance states, "All seasonal recreational vehicles must be registered with the land owner and the registration shall be presented to the governing body upon request." The Council motioned to ask the landowner for the RVs' registration.

If there are questions the deadline for getting on the June agenda is **Monday, June 10**. Next meeting **Wednesday, June 12 at 6:00 PM**.

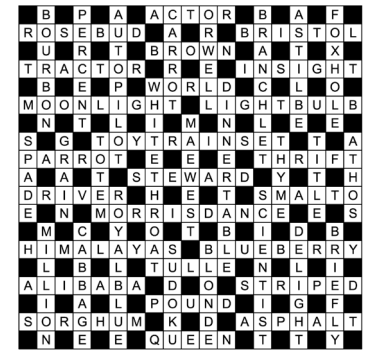

Attending church:

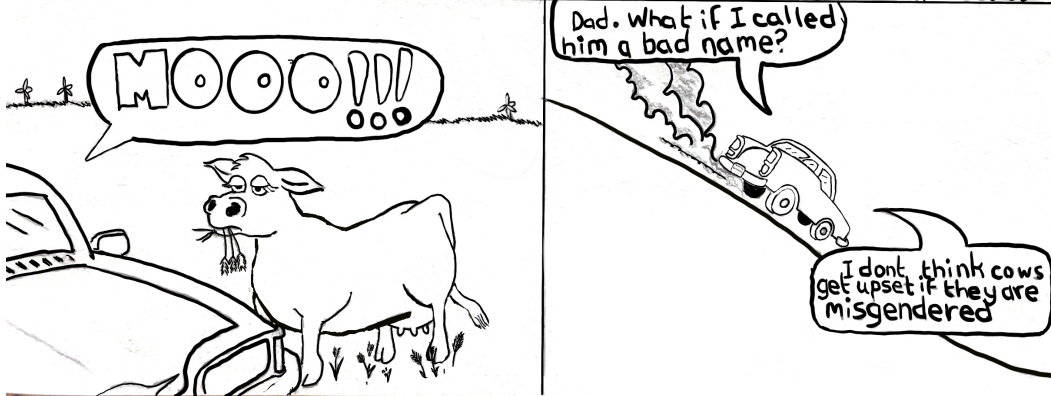
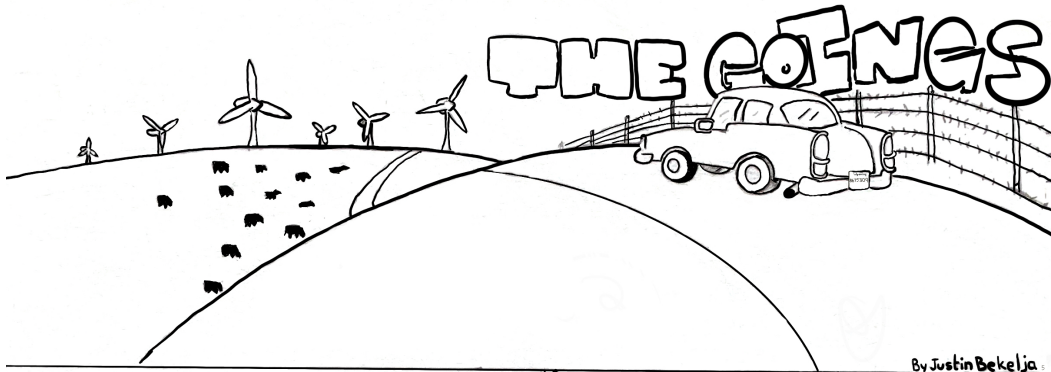
